#### BEHAVIOURS OF EFFECTIVE PATIENT COUNSELORS

Pharmacists can have a significant and positive impact on patient care and therapeutic outcomes through effective counseling.

#### Main objectives for patient counseling:

- Assessing the patient's understanding of the therapy, including proper use and adverse effects of the medication
- Improving patient adherence
- Motivating the patient to take an active role in health management.

## Patient counseling can improve patient care by:

- Reducing medication errors
- Increasing patient's understanding & management of their medical condition
- Minimizing incidence of the adverse drug reactions and drug-drug interactions
- Improving patient outcomes and satisfaction with care


Although every pharmacist implements individualized techniques to counsel the patients, many skills are vital to successful pharmacist-patient interaction during patient counseling sessions.

#### 10 features of effective patient counseling:

- 1. Establish Trust
- 2. Communicate Verbally
- 3. Communicate Nonverbally
- 4. Listen
- 5. Ask Questions
- 6. Remain Clinically Objective
- 7. Show Empathy and Encouragement
- 8. Provide Privacy and Confidentiality
- 9. Tailor Counseling to Meet Patient Needs
- 10. Motivate Patients



### **Key Points to be Covered During Counseling**



#### Points to discuss

- · Name of drug
- Indication
- Dosage regimen
- · Route of administration
- · How to take the medication
- When to take and how long to take the medication; scheduling
- · Take with food or without food
- Compliance
- · What to do if a dose is missed
- Side effect(s)
- Beneficial effects/therapeutic outcomes (if applicable)



#### PLACEBO: SUCCESSFUL TREATMENT FOR INSOMNIA

A new study published in Brain indicates that successful treatment for insomnia may not actually require complicated neurofeedback (direct training of brain functions). Rather, it appears patients who simply believe they're getting neurofeedback training appear to get the same benefits. Insomnia affects between 10 and 35% of the population worldwide. However, despite the burden of insomnia on our society, only few studies have

addressed this issue non-pharmacologically. Researchers here recruited thirty patients with primary insomnia, who underwent neurofeedback treatment and placebo-feedback treatment over several weeks. Researchers conclude that for the treatment of primary insomnia, neurofeedback does not have a specific efficacy beyond unspecific placebo effects. They did not find an advantage of neurofeedback over placebo-feedback. Researchers find that improvement of symptoms was not specific to neurofeeback training, but rather seems to have been brought about by unspecific factors

#### MOLECULE STOPS FATAL PEDIATRIC BRAIN TUMOR

The scientists have found a molecule that stops the growth of an aggressive pediatric brain tumor. The tumor is always fatal and primarily strikes children under 10 years old. Every year, about 300 children under the age of 10 years old in the U.S. develop a tumor referred to as diffuse intrinsic pontine glioma (DIPG).

"This tumor kills every single kid who gets DIPG within one year. No one survives," said the study's first author, Andrea Piunti, a postdoctoral fellow in Shilatifard's lab in biochemistry and molecular genetics at Northwestern University Feinberg School of Medicine.

The molecule itself is not yet available commercially, another similar class of molecules, BET inhibitors, is being tested in clinical trials for pediatric leukemia and other types of tumors. These could be used in a clinical trial for the pediatric tumor, Piunti said (Source: www.worldpharmanews.com).
